***DRIVING THROUGH GREENBACK***

When I drive through Greenback, I'm filled with mixed emotions. I pass over the railroad at Jena and smile at the wonderful recycling center and its beautiful building amid all the recycling bins. I ache at the emptiness where the Anderson's Barn has stood for my entire lifetime. I'm thankful that God protected the lives of our citizens. The Time and Temperature Sign still looks out of place and I may never see anything but a stop sign where a light flashes. I'm thrilled to see the beautiful restoration on the corner of Highway 95 and Morganton Road

As I turn into downtown proper, I miss seeing the colored Barber Shop pole, the unique two-story bank building, and the tall buildings that finished the street just past the Drug Store, but when I see the Depot, I truly know I've come home. This building has been an integral part of making this community come to life. *(Ed. Note, although the first train came through Greenback in 1894, the present depot was built in 1914 when L & N purchased the railroad.)*

As a child, I could always imagine an old gun battle between the Marshall and the gunfighters who rode in with the train. The Marshall, with quickly deputized town leaders, is protecting the bank and the businesses while the gunfighters take hostages inside the depot. Of course the good guys, helped by reinforcements from Glendale, eventually save the day. *(A child's imagination beats TV and electronic games, any day. Editor)*

What are the landmarks in your mind that make Greenback what it is today? Do you remember the old Elementary School that greeted us, the big tree with a limb that graciously bent so that first graders could have a seat on its arm or stand to see above other small heads? Was it a chair in a playhouse or the perch atop a pirate's ship? What about those old buildings with the fronts high above the roof that looked like they had come out of the old west?

Do you remember when there was no Community Center? So many people said it couldn't be done. They didn't know Greenback very well, did they? When we were unable to get help, we had a group of leaders who had the vision and brought the community together. This is the same community that depends on their own volunteer fire department and rescue squad. Both were created and continue today from the spirit of this special place.

Have you ever heard anyone say? "If I could win the lottery, I'd love to see the Depot at Greenback restored"? I know many who have thought or heard phrases such as these. It really is a lovely thought, but is it a possibility or just a pipe dream? Is there a chance that the Depot could become more than just a nostalgic thought? Can it be saved from toll of neglect, lack of funding and perhaps lack of leadership that has been the fate of so many other old yet significant buildings? Or is the Depot one of these special exceptions?

Completed surveys may be left at any of these locations or mailed to the Greenback Historical Society at P.O. Box 165, Greenback, Tn. 37742. These surveys will be compiled and discussed at the next meeting of the Historical Society.

Your involvement is important. Let's not wait until something occurs that might prevent us from saving the building if it is as beloved as many believe. We want to be prepared. Tell us what you think and when the opportunity comes, let us be ready to act together as a community. Thank you for your response.
